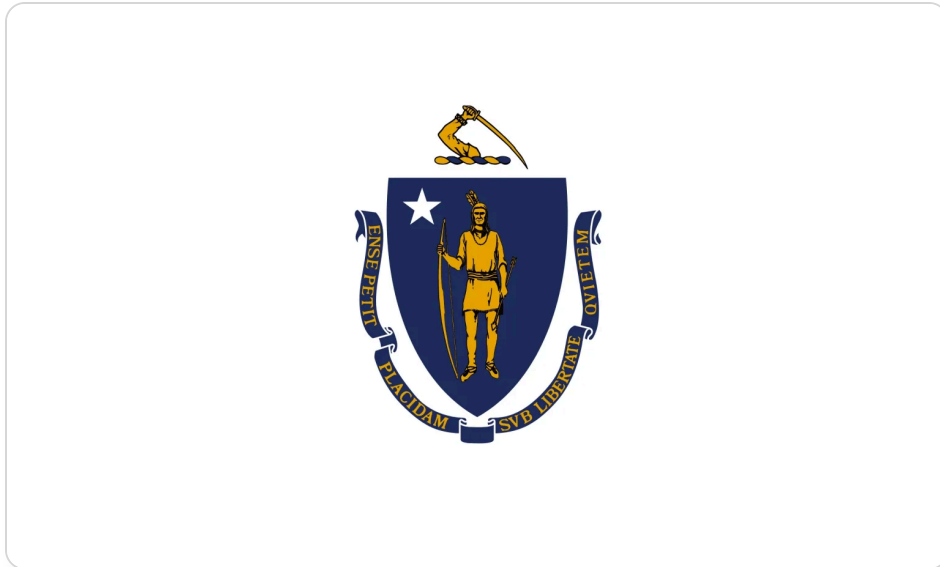

Massachusetts has embraced the rising popularity of electric bicycles (ebikes) with updated laws that facilitate their use while ensuring safety and compliance across the state. This guide will dive into what you need to know about the Massachusetts ebike laws, helping you navigate the streets and trails confidently and legally.

Important Takeaways of the Massachusetts Ebike Laws

Massachusetts law categorizes e-bikes into two main classes based on their operational mechanisms and speed capabilities:

- **Class 1 E-Bikes:** These e-bikes are pedal-assist only, with the motor ceasing to provide assistance when the bike reaches 20 mph. They must be equipped with a motor of no more than 750 watts.
- **Class 2 E-Bikes:** These include a throttle and also cease to assist at speeds above 20 mph, similar to Class 1 in terms of motor wattage.

Both classifications aim to standardize ebike use, but this falls short of the federally recognized, 3-class ebike system. Check out our article on [comprehensive e-bike classifications](#) for more details on regarding each classification.

Do you need a license to drive an electric bike under the new Massachusetts ebike laws? Thankfully the answer to this is no. As of August 10, 2022, the e-bike definition language was **signed into law** as amendments to the Transportation Bond Bill ([H.5151](#)) to include Class 1 and Class 2 definitions for e-bikes. This important aspect changed their designations.

- **Usage Restrictions:** Under the new Massachusetts electric bike laws, Class 1 and Class 2 e-bikes are not considered “motorized bicycles” and therefore do not require a license to operate. They are allowed on bikeways and bike paths unless a local jurisdiction has passed a specific regulation prohibiting them after a public notice and hearing process.

Where Can You Ride a Street Legal Electric Bike?

In Massachusetts, ebike riders enjoy many of the same rights as traditional cyclists, but with specific exceptions to accommodate the mechanical differences:

- **Roads and Bikeways:** Ebikes are allowed on most public roads and bikeways unless otherwise restricted by local ordinances.
- **Sidewalks:** Riding ebikes on sidewalks is prohibited to maintain pedestrian safety.
- **Trails:** The operation of ebikes on natural surface trails is generally restricted unless explicitly permitted by local authorities. This restriction helps preserve

the integrity of these paths for non-motorized use.

Local Regulations and Compliance

While state laws provide the basic framework, local jurisdictions have the authority to tailor regulations based on specific needs and conditions. For instance, certain bike paths may prohibit ebikes or impose specific speed limits. This local flexibility helps address community concerns and geographical challenges unique to different areas of the state.

Safety and Equipment Standards

Safety is a priority in Massachusetts' ebike legislation. Ebikes must comply with the same equipment and manufacturing standards as traditional bicycles, as set by the [U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission](#). Additionally, from January 1, 2023, all new ebikes must display a label indicating their class, maximum assisted speed, and motor wattage. Altering an ebike to change its speed capabilities is prohibited unless the label is updated accordingly to reflect these changes.

Singletrack and More

For those looking to explore the natural beauty of Massachusetts, e-bikes offer a unique opportunity. When it comes to trails, the use of ebikes is generally not permitted on natural surface trails (like those used for mountain biking) unless explicitly allowed by the local jurisdiction. This keeps the path clear for traditional non-motorized use unless a community decision is made otherwise. But if the area is open to motorized vehicles, such as a OHV trail, then your ebike would be permitted there.

A few great options for trail riding on your ebike include:

- [Pittsfield State Forest](#) offers a variety of trails for mountain bikers of all skill levels, spanning approximately 10,000 acres along the Taconic Ridge. The forest is noted for its scenic singletrack trails, including the Taconic Skyline Trail, which caters to both casual rides and more challenging adventures. Additional amenities include camping facilities, making it ideal for extended outdoor activities.

- **October Mountain**, the largest state forest in Massachusetts, covers over 16,500 acres and features a range of trails suitable for eMTB riders. The forest includes easy family-friendly rides as well as more demanding routes. It offers comprehensive recreational activities including hiking, boating, and camping, enhancing the biking experience with its natural beauty and extensive facilities.

Massachusetts Electric Bike Rebates

A significant addition to the state's e-bike policy is the introduction of rebates to encourage e-bike purchases. The Transportation Bond Bill has allocated \$1 million for rebates that provide \$500 to consumers and \$750 for low-income consumers buying e-bikes. However, these rebates are currently planned to be available only at point-of-sale through Massachusetts-based retailers. The specifics of this rebate program, including its official launch date, are still being finalized by the Department of Energy Resources.
